Gymnastics Success!

For the 14th consecutive year, St John's Gymnastics Squad won a place at the National Finals of the BSGA Team Floor and Vault competition in May to represent the South East Region. The event is held at the Fenton Manor Leisure Centre in Stoke-on-Trent, and accommodates a team from every Region of the United Kingdom in 3

categories across 2 age-groups. St John's represented the South East Region in the Under 14 Mixed and Under 19 Mixed categories, and experienced a host of success.

The Under 14 Mixed team achieved 6th place – an excellent achievement, for many of whom it was their first experience of a National event.

The Under 19 Mixed team achieved 2nd place and won the Regional award as the combined scores for the Boys, Girls and Mixed teams from the South East exceeded those of every other Region. Lauren Campbell (Year 12) also ranked the 2nd highest female in the whole event.

The Gymnastics Squad will be displaying their skills to students from St John's Primary School in June, whilst also supporting the primary students in a "stay and play" session, where they will have the opportunity to try some gymnastics themselves.

BOOK LAUNCH

The 6th in the series of books on War Memorials in the Borough was launched at the school on March 21st. Over 60 distinguished guests attended the 90 minute function. Mr Murphy, Head of History, presented using a PowerPoint in conjunction with Joel Williams-Modeste, Year 12. Guests included Councillor Harold Craske, Mayor of Gravesham, Dr Bhargawa Vasudaven, Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Kent, Mr David Rich, Institute of Education, Mrs Victoria Wallace, Director General, Commonwealth War Graves Commission and Mr Andrew Robertshaw, author and TV Personality.

This particular volume focuses on the memorials in Northfleet, Rosherville, the Overcliffe and Perry Street. 300 biographies written by the students of the History Society are included in the 458 page book; A4 sized, softback and in full colour. The book also has a tribute to the late Mr Tony Larkin – a wonderful patron of St John's. Copies of the book are available from the school at £25 a copy.


Literary Legends

THIS YEAR INSPIRED AND IN HONOUR OF THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF VOTES FOR Women and the end of WW1.



STAFF CHARITY CYCLE TO NORMANDY

The annual staff charity cycle to Normandy covering all 5 Landing

Beaches and the 2 Airborne drop zones took place over the weekend of March 23^{rd} to the 26^{th} .

Day 1 saw the intrepid group of 12 set off from the village of Troarn and finishing at Arromanches, a total of 50 miles. On the way the group passed the British and Canadian Landing Beaches and were welcomed on the way on their arrival at Coleville Montgomery. The group stayed at the Gold Beach Hotel which itself is situated adjacent to Gold Beach. Day 2 had the group travel to St Mere Eglise where after a visit to the Airborne Museum they were welcomed to Ravenoville by local historian Dave Ashe. After a talk which included a visit to the legendary Marmion Farm the group set off for the American Cemetery at Coleville. The 40 miles was covered in a little over two and a half hours despite the headwind which made cycling difficult. Dave Ashe continued his talk on American Airborne soldiers buried in the cemetery who were killed in action at Ravenoville. After the talk it was onwards to Arromanches – a distance of 20 miles. Day 3 saw the group visit the historic centres of St Valery-en-Caux – site of the evacuation in June 1940 and the surrender of the 51stHighland Division in 1940 – and Dieppe where lunch was had at Le Troubadour; the seats where Winston Churchill, Samuel Beckett and Oscar Wilde sat when in residence in the seaside town were noted as was the various scenes of battle during the raid in World War 2. Monies raised go to the Mayor's Charity Fund.

As I write, we are over two thirds of the way through our Year7, 8 and 9 Retreat season. Our school retreats are a day out at a spiritually inspiring venue, with about 40 students per day, to retreat from the pace and noise of everyday life, to make space for God and to reflect on the important questions of life and consider where it is taking us. They have been wonderful days ... so far!

Our Year 9 Retreat days are provided by seminarians 'training' to be priests at St John's Seminary, near Guildford, where they live for six years. After some games to wake the students up after the coach journey, they began to develop the theme of the day which was the voices that bombard us from all directions, some good, some bad, that influence so many of our views and choices in life. But we need to discover our own voice, to become our own person, and learn to listen to the one quiet voice that enables us to become the true and best version of ourselves that we were created to be; to make quiet space for God's voice. The seminarians shared some of their own journeys and struggles and the day included a fascinating tour of the seminary including the library which wouldn't have looked out of place in Harry Potter!
