NARROWING THE GAP

St John's Catholic Comprehensive School - Pupil Premium

1 Background

The Pupil Premium is a government initiative to target resources on those pupils deemed to be from a disadvantaged background. Specifically the Pupil Premium funding is calculated for those pupils who have been entitled to Free School Meals (FSM) at any point over the past 6 years (Ever 6) or those children who have been looked after for one day or more, are adopted or are under a special guardianship order or residential order. For the financial year 2015-6 funding is £935 per pupil and £1900 for a looked after child. The government has not dictated how Pupil Premium funding should be spent, but what is clear is that the money should be used to promote strategies which narrows the attainment gap between the highest and lowest achieving pupils.

3 Strategies for narrowing the gap - An overview

St John's is a non-selective school with 31% being eligible for Pupil Premium funding. 16% have Additional Educational Needs (AEN). No single intervention provides a complete solution to the complex educational issues in any school and it is therefore a multi-faceted approach that we feel offers the best opportunities for pupils to succeed.

Interventions come in a variety of forms but must be specific to the needs of the students and not simply generic strategies. Examples at St John's include:

The creation of a smaller groups in years 7 and 8 and the employment of a primary trained teachers to support these pupils

1:1 reading support for KS3 pupils

PP priority given in all lessons, including marking

Additional GSCE Maths and English lessons for disadvantages pupils in year 11

Specific resources to support learners in subjects

New attendance structure to improve attendance of Pupil Premium pupils

Financial support for uniform and extra-curricular activities.

4 Pupil Premium and spending

The total funding received by St John's for 2015-6 academic year was **£250,445**. This funding is spend in a variety of ways with the direct and explicit aim of narrowing the attainment gap between the highest and lowest achievers. This includes investment in both academic and pastoral initiatives. A breakdown of the expenditure for 2015-6 is shown below.

Comment

While PP students perform in line with PP nationally, the gap between PP and non PP students in St John's in relation to the traditional 5A*-C measure has remained wide, and continues to be a key priority for the school in the new Progress 8 measure. The gap between PP and non-PP in the traditional 5*A-G measure is significantly better than national.

Comment

All students in English perform significantly better than national, with a narrow gap between PP and non-PP. In Mathematics, PP students perform less well compared to PP students nationally and the gap between PP and non PP in mathematics is wider than national. In relation to Best 8 Added Value, all students including PP perform better than national, but the gap between PP and non PP is wider than national.
